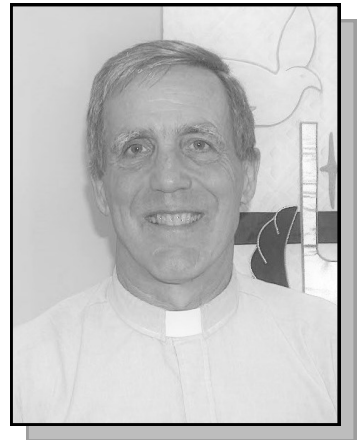

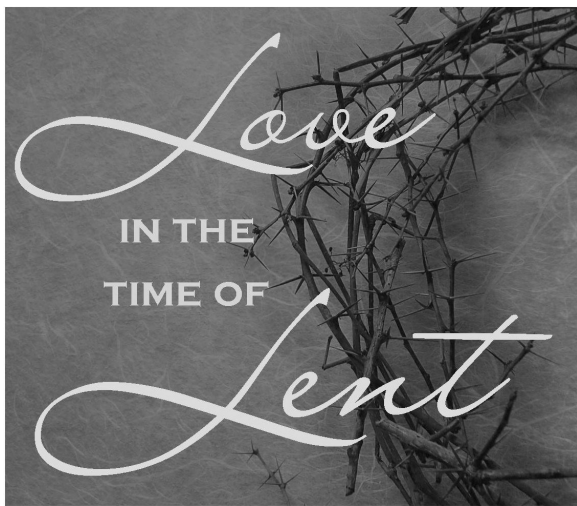
So, you heard bad things about me in church, did you? Tell me. Does this face look evil? Just asking.

Council Highlights

The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. Devotions were led by Joe Casey. Minutes of the January 2018 meeting were approved.

Property

Tom Bane introduced Drayton Campbell, an interior designer who has been working with the property team to make plans for renovation and redesign of the narthex. Ms. Campbell presented paint samples, drawings and photographs of her proposal. Council members are asked to email Tom Bane with questions, comments and concerns before the committee moves forward with the next steps of the process. Sybil Long reported the good work Carl Bartlett has done to repair a section of kneelers in the sanctuary and noted how the initiative of individuals can make a big difference.

Finance

Tom Henry presented the financial reports and noted that January's giving was \$7,433 less than actual expenses and \$9,612 less than budgeted expenses. The Finance Team will examine financial activity and discuss at the next meeting.

New Business

- Updates to the nursery policy were presented with changes that more accurately reflect current practices and safety protocols. Claire Birdsong requested that the requirement for nursery worker/volunteer training be added. The motion to accept the policy was tabled until the amended version is presented at the March meeting.
- Paul Osmundson requested that teams send information and photographs about their programs, projects and accomplishments to the Communications Team and to the office manager so that information can be distributed through the newsletter, e-news, Twitter, etc. It was noted that Council needs to create a policy for obtaining approval for the release of photos of and/or information concerning minors. (Note that Paul's email is posmundson@aol.com.)
- Pastor Trump asked Council members to review the church's vision and mission statements and terminology used in those statements. He suggested that a helpful resource for exploring church visioning, mission, and strategies for the 21st century is Mark Tidsworth's book *Shift*. The council will read the book together and discuss in the coming months.
- Tom Henry requested that each team create a list of specific service opportunities for members of the congregation to take responsibility for without long-term commitments, and to forward suggestions to him before the March meeting.

Unfinished Business

- Tom Henry reported on the information gathered and studied so far by the security committee as the group considers creation of an updated emergency operations plan.
- Council approved a request from the Lutheran Services Carolinas' Education Coordinator to use the church van for refugee community meeting transportation.

Closing

Pastor Trump led prayers for parish concerns.



Operation Inasmuch is a national movement designed to give church communities the opportunity to serve. Last April, St. Andrew's had a tremendous response and many projects were accomplished. This year the Social Ministry team, in partnership with other groups around the church, will sponsor projects and opportunities to serve our community in a variety of ways throughout April. Fulfilling Their Promises

After Paul's conversion on the road to Damascus, he was compelled to share Christ's resurrection and love with the world. He knew that his experience and newfound knowledge could help build communities of service, encourage deeper relationships, and create a sense of belonging to all who heard the message.

Don't we all love to share good news, especially when it can make a positive difference in the lives of those with whom we are sharing it? Even better, don't we love to make a difference in the life of a child?

Recently, Joyce and Trent Shealy had the opportunity to study the book *Hold On To Your Kids: Why Parents Need to Matter More Than Peers* by Drs. Gordon Neufeld and Gabor Mate', which delves into creating and sustaining deep, attached relationships with your children. It also stresses the importance of having trusting connections between children and adults outside of their home (e.g. in the church). The rewards of such relationships are youth and young adults who are confident because they were valued and independent because they were attached.

Joyce and Trent shared the information from the book and its companion video during 4 Sunday School sessions. The classroom was full and the discussions were rich! I am grateful that they saw the importance and the urgency in sharing what they'd learned and felt that it fit perfectly with the baptismal promises they'd made, not only to their own children, but to the children of many who attended the class. We are called to be an encouragement to parents and important adults in the lives of our youth. In the classes, we learned from each other and clearly understood that we are all in this together. I was uplifted by the participation and the words of other parents. Thank you all!

Even though the material was from a secular perspective, I suspect that the author was familiar with Paul and the communities he nurtured. The following quote from the book nicely summarizes its intent and, with few word changes, could easily fit into one of Paul's letters:

The key to activating maturation is to take care of the attachment needs of the child. To foster independence we must first invite dependence; to promote individuation we must provide a sense of belonging and unity; to help the child separate we must assume the responsibility for keeping the child close. We help a child let go by providing more contact and connection than he himself is seeking. When he asks for a hug, we give him a warmer one than he is giving us. We liberate children not by making them work for our love but by letting them rest in it. We help a child face the separation involved in going to sleep or going to school by satisfying his need for closeness.

Thank you, Joyce and Trent!

May we all be the love in which others may rest, just as we rest in our Father's.

Faith Formation Corner

I always consider it a privilege to participate in worship as a lay assistant. It's a special privilege to do so on Ash Wednesday. To be up close and personal with people who are being reminded of their mortality is an honor. When I receive the ashes on my forehead, I'm remembering my baptism and that a pastor 51 years ago traced that same shape on me after he put water on my head.

I've served in professional church ministry for 30 years. In that time, some people have asked if I'd ever considered being an ordained pastor. The main reason I'm not a pastor is that I don't feel a call to ordained ministry, but I usually give a different answer. I usually say that I couldn't be a pastor because I don't think I'd ever make it through a baptism without crying and that it is a bit distracting to a family to have a crying pastor along with their crying baby! That part is really true. It never fails to get to me when the Holy Spirit uses water and word to welcome someone into the church family.

On Sunday, I witnessed the Holy Spirit at work. During the final hymn, I was standing in the narthex ready to greet visitors when a precious family approached. The mom had been helping in the nursery that day and her 2-year-old and 5-year-old girls came skipping along beside her. The little one ran over to the baptismal font with her big sister not far behind. Big sister reached into the font and dipped her finger in the water and then reached down to her little sister and traced a cross on her forehead. Little sister giggled and reached up toward the font. Big sister tried to pick her up so she could reach the font, but it was too high. An usher who was standing there reached out his arms to the little one and she came running over to him. He gently lifted her so she could dip her finger in the water. (There may have even been a splash or two.) Then, little sister wiggled out of his arms and traced a cross on big sister's forehead. The mom and I were watching all of this. We looked at each other and smiled; both realizing we'd witnessed something holy. This is what the kingdom of God looks like.

I'm thankful for these big and little sisters who remember their baptism and remind me during this season of Lent that we are all walking with crosses on our foreheads. I'm thankful for the usher who provided the help when needed. I'm thankful for the mom and dad who taught these children to love each other in this way and who faithfully bring their children to church so they can grow in the faith community. I'm thankful for this church family who made baptismal promises to these girls and all other children at St. Andrew's. Mostly, I'm thankful to God who loves us enough to come to walk alongside us in the sunny days and the dark days in our lives and who never abandons us.
