Sunday, August 19 at 11:00 a.m.



It has been headed up and led by our Bishop, Herman Yoos, in coordination with many other churches, primarily AME communities. The Bishop felt called, as we all need to be called, to do something in response other than pray. Prayer is critical. God hears our prayers. However, how can we hear one another?





We are very divided in our country, especially along racial lines. At this day described in this newsletter, we all get to go to a movie, at a movie

theater. We will watch the powerful critically acclaimed movie SELMA with people of different racial backgrounds, then walk a few yards to Redeemer Lutheran and eat supper together, while talking about what we experienced in the movie. Most critically we try to listen to one another. We try to hear the other. We try to WHOLLY listen as well as practice HOLY LISTENING. If you asked me what "Holy Listening" means I would say it is listening with compassion and empathy, without judgement but open to the other's experience. What might you say?

As your pastor I want to strongly encourage people to attend this event. Do not kid yourself. We need it. This society is not "over" racism, and neither is our church.

ELCA Youth Gathering 2018

10 youth and 3 adults attended the ELCA Youth Gathering this summer in Houston, TX. Here are reflections from some members of the group:

JOYCE SHEALY

What was one thing you learned at the youth gathering that was new information for you?

That the ELCA is actively involved in caring for separated immigrant children.

How did the ELCA Youth Gathering impact your faith?

Increased my faith by giving me time with the young upcoming leaders of our church, and seeing all the enthusiastic youth from across the country!

What was your favorite part of the trip?

Hearing how our girls were impacted by what they were seeing and hearing every day.

Share a story about our service day.

It was super-hot, and we were super-tired. But the girls never complained and worked so hard. And, we saw a horse just hanging out in a vacant lot in the middle of the city!

Why should we take kids to the next youth gathering in 2021 in Minneapolis?

It is easy to think of Lutheran as "small," when in our area there are so many big churches of other denominations. Great to see 30,000-plus youth that are also Lutheran, and to actively learn about all the ways the Lutheran church supports us in living out our faith through ministries and programs that focus on serving those that have need.

KAYLEE SCHODOWSKI

At the gathering, I learned a lot about the Lutheran Church. For starters, I did not realize how accepting of the LGBTQ+ community our denomination is. I personally am supportive, but I did not realize that our church was. Throughout the week, I saw many signs of acceptance towards others, whether it being the sparks or the booths that were set up in the interactive center. My favorite part of the trip was either the mass gatherings each night or interacting with those in our group of girls as well as meeting many, many new people. For our service day, we were assigned to pick up trash along the streets. And although that may sound hot, sweaty and boring, Peyton, Kaitlyn, Ms. Sandra and I were able to meet Ms. Kathy. She had part of her roof taken off from the flooding a little while back, and while the 4 of us talked to her, she opened up quite a bit more. Ms. Kathy was such a funny, sassy and all around happy person who despite her situation was working hard to make the best of it. (And she liked my hair!!) The mass gatherings every night were extremely impactful. Those who spoke did an amazing job of conveying what it means to be a Lutheran and relayed stories from their personal experiences to back everything that they were saying. It was such a crazy and surreal thing to have 31,000 people, all with at least one thing in common, singing and praising Jesus together. I wish that I could have the ability to go and experience it over and over, but I am so blessed and thankful to have our church's support in sending our group.

DONNA BIRDSONG

I have now had the opportunity to attend both the Detroit and Houston youth gatherings. Although I was unsure of whether or not Houston would have the same impact on me, it proved to be a fantastic experience. This youth gathering promoted the idea of inclusiveness within the Lutheran church, which reaffirmed my spiritual alignment with this denomination and Christianity as a whole. It is so easy to become bogged down in disagreements and differences in this political era, especially given that this is what I plan to study the next four years in college; however, 31,000 people coming together to proclaim that God's love is for everyone is certainly a reminder that this crazy thing called life is about fostering that love in every aspect of our lives, being grateful for the unconditional love given to us.

I think you should go on the youth gathering trip to Minneapolis in 2021 because it changes your perspective on life once you get back home. LAYNE BIRDSONG

I attended the ELCA Youth Gathering as an adult leader for the St. Andrew's youth. Among the experiences there (thousands of teens, different accents, loud music, bright lights, various speakers, lots of walking), the one which struck me the most was the impact of 31,000 Lutherans on a city.

Every one of those Lutherans ate every day. Assuming \$20 per day per person for 4 days, that comes to \$2,480,000 paid to the Houston food and beverage industry.

Every one of those Lutherans also performed a morning of service work. For example, our group picked up trash in a poor neighborhood. At an average of 4 hours per person, that comes to 124,000 hours of service given to the Houston community.

As significant as those numbers were (even in a city of almost 7 million people), the bigger impact came from the personal connections tied to them. When our group ate, the restaurant staff met 10 polite, cheerful girls in Lutheran t-shirts. When we picked up trash, the residents saw strangers in orange ELCA shirts who cared enough to do something hot and uncomfortable to make their neighborhood a little bit better. I feel sure that those interactions will have a longer effect on Houston than the food that we bought and the hours that we worked.

The Youth Gathering was an important experience for those of us who attended, and I thank the St. Andrew's congregation for its support.

CHRISTA LASALLE

I liked how multiple people spoke each night at the mass gatherings. It was interesting to hear the vastly different stories of the speakers yet all having an outcome of following Christ.

It's super cool to see all of the other Lutheran youth in the same place for a reason. Going to the Gathering also provides a great learning experience for what things ELCA gets involved in.

Faith Formation Corner:

Why Campfirmation at Lutheridge? Each year we take a group of kids to Lutheridge for a week, which counts as a year of study towards their confirmation instruction. This year, Pastor Trump took 8 boys who will be entering 8th and 9th grades this fall. The boys stay in cabins with cool counselors who are college age guys who aren't afraid to be goofy. They play games, swim, hike, sing, dance, do crafts, and learn about faith. One of the moms, Georgia Godfrey, brought home 6 boys from camp this year (4 Campfirmation kids and 2 younger kids). In the van ride home, her son Carter turned around to the back of the van and asked the other boys to share their highs and lows of the week and a God Moment. Here's what they came up with:



Highs: the pool, end-of-the-week celebration, food, gaga ball

Lows: food, counselor had an allergic reaction from a bee sting, camper breaking his leg, forgetting to wear bug spray

God Moments: closing/opening vespers, bro vespers, traveling through a storm on the way back from the outing

Other comments: cabin poker night, hearing the band Veaux tell their story and perform, PT belly-flopping into the pool, bear day (including bears in all camp songs)

A God Moment for me is knowing that our church encourages kids to spend a week away without electronics looking for ways that God shows up in the world. Thank you, people of St. Andrew's, for helping to send our kids to camp where they can learn these life skills of Christian Leadership.



My name is Carter Woolly. St. Andrew's has always been a very special place to me. I was baptized in the church by my grandfather, Pastor Don Woolly, and have worshiped when visiting Uncle John and Aunt Beth. I'm always struck by the kindness and courtesy of the congregation to visitors and its generosity towards charity and good causes.

I recently graduated from Lenoir-Rhyne University, with a bachelor's degree in Political Science. Perhaps like many of you I am frustrated with the political climate of the day and feel the need to serve is best placed in the hands of God's people and in God's church. As a recent graduate, I felt there was no better time than the present to participate in something radically perspective shattering and so, in April, I accepted the opportunity to serve as a Young Adult in Global Mission (YAGM) volunteer to Rwanda.

In case you are not familiar with the program, YAGM is part of the Global Mission wing of the ELCA. Each year YAGM sends out around 80 young people for a year of international service. There are YAGM programs in Argentina/Uruguay, Australia, Cambodia, Central Europe, Jerusalem/West Bank, Mada-

gascar, Mexico, Rwanda, Senegal, and Southern Africa. In accepting my call to YAGM, I will be working in accompaniment with local Lutheran congregations and social agencies in Rwanda.



I am incredibly excited to learn and walk with the Rwandan people. Rwanda is an incredibly young country; nearly half of its population is under 18 years old. It is also a country which has experienced incredible economic and political growth since the 1994 genocide and the Congo crisis of the early 2000s. Foreign development, an opening of the economy, and the expansion of political rights for minorities have led *The Economist* magazine to call Rwanda "the African success story of the 21st century." As such, Rwanda has incredibly unique challenges and opportunities. Its youthfulness and drive to expand its economy mean Rwanda is at a key junction in the development of social ministries and education; issues which the Lutheran church is committed to meeting head on.

The total cost to deploy a YAGM for a year is \$15,000. The church pledges to fund \$10,000 and each participant is asked to raise \$5,000 by the end of the summer. I will be writing a blog post and sending out emails throughout the year with updates and further information about my year in Rwanda. 

Let's Help our Neighbors at E.E. Taylor Elementary School

It's back-to-school time! Many parents in our neighborhood struggle to meet their children's needs. Because of this, St. Andrew's has been working closely with E.E. Taylor Elementary School to provide much needed support to the students and teachers. In addition to the Backpack Ministry (year-round), we will again be having a School Supplies Drive. We will be collecting these items through Sunday, August 19.



In addition to school supplies, St. Andrew's is committed to help feed kids at E.E. Taylor on the weekends through the Backpack Ministry. Beginning in September, we will begin packing for these students again, and be assured that they will have food on the weekends when they don't have school breakfasts and lunches. Last year, we funded weekend meals for 45 students and packed for an additional 20 students who received funding through a grant at E.E. Taylor, for a total of 65 students EACH WEEK! Our goal this year is to raise funding for 45 students again. The past few years it has cost \$7.50 per child per week, or roughly \$250 per child for the school year to provide a weekend worth of meals that these students otherwise may not have. We anticipate the numbers being very similar again this year.

Here's how you can help:

- Volunteer to set-up delivered food from Harvest Hope (usually on the first Thursday morning of the month)
- Volunteer to help pack that food on the following Sunday morning
- Volunteer to deliver food to the school each Friday morning
- Sponsor a backpack (or part of a backpack) for a child at \$250 for the school year
- Pray for this ministry, the workers and especially the children in need

Council Highlights

- Tom Henry called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.
- The devotion was led by Claire Birdsong.
- Minutes of the June 2018 meeting were approved.
- There was a special report on the narthex and parlor lighting presented by Steve Blackwell.
- The Pastor's and Deacon's reports were accepted as distributed.
- **Finance:** Tom Henry noted that giving in June was better than in May but still behind overall. We received \$3,498 less than actual expenses and \$4,769 less than budgeted expenses. YTD giving through June was \$18,626 less than actual expenses and \$30,784 less than budgeted expenses. To meet our budget, we need to receive approximately \$40,000 per month in current and benevolence giving.
- **Property:** A report submitted by this team notes that bids are being collected for the repair of roof and window leaks in the narthex area and for the addition of a handicap-accessible restroom in the gathering area; the committee is looking into giving facelifts to restrooms in the children's wing; volunteers are needed for the grounds clean-up day on Saturday, July 28.
- **Stewardship:** A report submitted by this team noted that plans are in the works for a 2018 stewardship focus on "grace, gratitude, and giving."
- **Social:** A report submitted by this team noted that we'll begin collecting school supplies for E.E. Taylor Elementary School soon. It reported that St. Andrew's, through the Social Ministry Team, is sending a donation to Swansea First Baptist Church to support its laundry/shower trailer ministry (a partner in our Family Promise ministry) and to Christa LaSalle to support her travel on a mission trip with her dance ministry team.

New Business

- Sandra shared a request from Carter Woolly (grandson of Pastor Don Woolly, son of Pastor Rhodes Woolly, nephew of Beth Woolly Trump) to include in our newsletter for monetary support for his participation in the ELCA's Young Adult in Global Mission in Rwanda for a full year. Council approved two motions: (1) to create a communications policy that requires any individual's request for monetary assistance to be shared with the congregation through existing communications tools be only for programs affiliated with the ELCA and approved by Council, and that (2) Council permit Carter Woolly to publish his request for YAGM support in the church newsletter.
- Council considered a request from Pastor Trump that St. Andrew's support his participation in the three-year Leadership for Faithful Innovation Project presented by the S.C. Synod and Luther Seminary and the subsequent participation of the entire St. Andrew's congregation. Tom Henry shared a letter from Bishop Herman Yoos recognizing the foresighted leadership of Pastor Trump and nominating our church to be part of this initiative. Council voted to (1) approve Pastor Trump's participation in the Leadership for Faithful Innovation project, and (2) approve increasing Pastor Trump's continuing education budget by \$250 in years #2 and #3 of the program to cover program tuition. (Tom Henry made a personal gift to cover the first year's tuition.) A third motion to approve the expenditure of \$1,500 for congregational training was tabled until Tom Henry is able to suggest an appropriate line item from which to fund our participation.
- Council discussed Steve Blackwell's status report on the narthex and parlor lighting improvements and considered his request for \$5,250 to purchase necessary materials for the project. (Steve is waiving installation expenses.) A motion to accept Steve's report and approve funding for the lighting project as presented, using monies from the special narthex fund, was approved.
- Council requested that church staff revisit the current policy of notifying the congregation of the deaths of members' spouses/partners and children only. It was the consensus of Council that the deaths of other family members should be included, using the pastor's discretion, so that we all are able to provide timely support and comfort to all members who are grieving.

Closing: Sandra led prayers for parish concerns.
