

A special call to and remembrance of all the saints, including those from this community who have died this year.



A Word from Pastor Trump

There was an interesting article the other day that I heard. The story is about Jan Karski who was one of the first people to share eyewitness accounts of ghettos and concentration camps with Allied leaders from London and the United States. To give a better firsthand account Karski was smuggled in and out of the Warsaw ghetto and the Izbica transit camp. Yet, even his eyewitness accounts were not able to persuade many of the officials he met. He wrote:

"It is not true, as sometimes has been written, that I was the first one to present to the West the whole truth of the fate of the Jews in occupied Poland. There were others. . . . The tragedy was that these testimonies were not believed. Not because of ill



will, but simply because the facts were beyond the human imagination. I experienced this myself. When I was in the United States and told [Supreme Court] Justice Felix Frankfurter the story of the Polish Jews, he said, at the end of our conversation, "I cannot believe you." We were with the Polish ambassador to the U.S., Jan Ciechanowski. Hearing the justice's comments, he was indignant. "Lieutenant Karski is on an official mission. My government's authority stands behind him. You cannot say to his face that he is lying." Frankfurter's answer was, "I am not saying that he is lying. I only said that I cannot believe him, and there is a difference" (https://www.facinghistory.org - The Difference between Knowing and Believing, Holocaust and Human Behavior, Chapter 9).

What he heard and saw went so contrary to his belief in humanity that he could not comprehend it being real. Sometimes I wonder if we do that? Do we encounter reports in the news yet we just refuse to believe that someone could act like that? Or that the new facts science has brought us could be real? What do we do when something butts up against what we WANT to believe? As a preacher, it is easier to tell people what the WANT to hear than what we need to hear. It is easier to write a sermon proclaiming what we want to hear, such as "God will make everything ok" or "God will make you happy" or "God has given us all our stuff at the expense of others." Then you have the evidence of the Gospel laid before you. Can we believe otherwise? Can we allow ourselves to embrace the evidence that God calls for us to be different, and live differently, and abide by God's notion of what makes for true living? Can we believe that the way of grace, mercy and reconciliation is the way of true life, as God would call us to live?

WHANNA BOUKNIGHT



Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of the congregation will be held on SUNDAY, November 10, 2019, at 10:50 in the sanctuary. You will be asked to vote on two matters, details of which are in the newsletter.

- 1. The nominations for Congregational Council
- 2. The annual ministry plan

2020 Ministry Plan

The full ministry plan may be acquired by contacting the office via phone or email. Abbreviated copies are available in the narthex. It may also be viewed via St. Andrew's Lutheran web site. The overall 2020 Ministry Plan increased by 5.7%. New line items include our new Youth Associate as well as the Yoga ministry. Staff salary increases represent our goal to move closer to and maintain Synod guidelines.



Percentages of giving to the Synod and other charitable giving remain the same. Additional increases such as health insurance, utilities, supplies, and maintenance were adjusted to reflect actual expenses.

There will be representatives from the Congregational Council available in the parlor to answer questions on Sunday, November 3, following each service. You may also email Tom Henry, Council President, at tomandt@verizon.net with questions.

Important News! - From Congregational Council

There have been some major things in the works about which some of you may not be aware. These would require discussion, approval and funding by the congregation. The Congregational Council wanted to start talking about them now even before all the costs and plans are proposed.

Narthex

Progress continues as the Council Design Team solidifies the Narthex and Parlor development plans with our contracted architects and designers. The Congregational Council will be sharing the design proposed for this space and will be seeking your feedback. The intent is to convert the look and function of these spaces into a welcoming area for people to gather.

HVAC (Heating/Ventilation/Air Conditioning)

Many of you are aware of the challenges our church is experiencing with our air conditioning. In the October council meeting, Justin Varco, a mechanical engineer with experience in HVAC, provided an overview of the present state of our HVAC systems with the prognosis being not good. Some units are not currently working.

Many of our units are very old and well past their expected life cycle. The council is in the process of reviewing the options available to address our needs to include both the replacement and repair of these HVAC units. The two-story educational building AC is already broken beyond the point of cost-effective repair.

Capital Campaign

A capital campaign is an important part of every church's financial strategy, whether it is looking to raise money to renovate or to retire debt. Ensuring that the mission/vision is aligned with the congregational goals is paramount to the success of such a campaign. As a means to prepare for its future needs, the council is evaluating an outside consultant who has a long, successful history in facilitating funding campaigns. More on this effort will be forthcoming from Council as we gather additional information.

When we have the information needed the Council will be hosting informational meetings during the Sunday school hours to share more on all the above topics.

Christ calls us to share with our brothers and sisters—this is the very meaning of discipleship. We often forget that Christ himself was born into poverty! There are few matters about which Christ preaches more in the Gospels than the poor. It is our duty, our honor, and our call as Christians to care for, share with, and love the poor. In doing so, we not only serve Christ, but we become Christ for others.

Last Christmas the St. Andrew's Lutheran community gave with open hearts to families in the E.E. Taylor Elementary School Backpack program. This holiday season, through our partnership with E.E. Taylor, we have an opportunity to once again sponsor 65 children in that program and put Christmas smiles on their faces. Here's how it works:

- 1. Take a tag (or multiple tags if you wish) and look on the back of the tag for <u>the large number</u>. Each tag also contain(s) the child's name, gender, <u>grade</u>, clothing size, their interest(s), and one NEED per child.
- 2. Write your name next to the corresponding child's name on the sign-up sheet.
- 3. Purchase gifts based on the child's information. We ask that you include **a book or books** and one or more of the following:
 - 1. The NEED identified on the tag
 - 2. Clothing
 - 3. A toy or game related to their interest
- 4. Please limit the total gift amount to \$45.
- 5. Return your *wrapped gift with the original tag attached* and put it under the tree by **Sunday**, **December 8** so we can deliver gifts to E.E. Taylor before their winter break.

Council Highlights

Opening

• Tom Henry called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Paul Osmundson led the devotion. Council approved the minutes of the September 2019 meeting.

The Pastor's and Deacon's Reports

Pastor Trump's and Deacon Holland's reports were accepted as presented.

Finance

Giving for September 2019 was \$3,489 more than actual expenses and \$3,658 less than budgeted expenses.
 YTD giving through September 30 was \$4,825 less than actual expenses and \$22,183 less than budgeted expenses.

Property

• Justin Varco (SALC member and mechanical engineer) shared a detailed visual presentation he had prepared on the status of current air conditioning and heating systems throughout the church building and led a discussion on options for repairing and/or replacing systems and equipment. Council agreed that addressing the HVAC deficits in the children's education/fellowship hall wing -- both downstairs and upstairs -- is the most critical need, followed by addressing ongoing problems with the systems that service the sanctuary, adult Sunday School wing, and office areas. All HVAC equipment and systems in place have exceeded their life expectancies and need replacement or significant repair where possible. Justin agreed to prepare a cost analysis of the options available, compare benefits of each potential course of action, and make a recommendation for the Property Team and Council to consider. In the meantime, the team will monitor the equipment and as effectively as possible maintain comfortable temperatures with quick, temporary repairs.

Social Ministry

• Twenty volunteers from St. Andrew's served meals to approximately 160 people on Saturday, Oct. 5, as part of the Lunch on the Lawn project to help feed the hungry and homeless of Columbia.

New Business

- In a September 20, 2019, email vote, Council approved a motion to revise the Deacon position's job description to reflect supervision of the new Youth Associate position and minimal shifting of other administrative and ministry responsibilities.
- In a September 26, 2019, email vote, Council approved spending \$588 from savings for air conditioning maintenance work.
- The following were approved by Council for confirmation: Hannah Montgomery, Jake Semones, Jake Derrick, Luke Bradley, Joshua Bruce, Thomas Daly, George Schodowski, Michael Berger, and Carter Godfrey. Confirmation will take place on Reformation Sunday, October 27.
- Council approved a motion to spend \$2,143 from the undesignated memorial fund to purchase new tables for Sunday school classrooms (7) and the fellowship hall (6), as well as chairs (15) for one adult Sunday school classroom.
- Council approved nominations submitted by the Nominating Committee for the two Council positions open as of January 1, 2020. Curtis Amick and Whanna Bouknight will be presented to the congregation as candidates for Council membership for a 2020-2022 term.

Unfinished Business

• Pastor Trump gave an overview of options that could be considered for continuing the narthex renovation project under way and executing the extensive and time-sensitive work needed to repair and replace HVAC system components throughout the building. Considerations include cost estimates to be obtained, the use of gifts earmarked for the narthex and available monies in other funds and savings, future opportunities to raise funds for capital projects, and the potential necessity to obtain a bank loan to complete one or both projects. Council will continue the discussion after reviewing Justin Varco's recommendations and estimates for HVAC system equipment and installation.
