



A Word from Pastor Trump

Change is inevitable. Of that we can be certain. We begin the season of Lent, and while there are those who think our traditions surrounding this season are etched in stone, we know that religious practices developed over long periods of time. There were some scholars who argued that a period of "Lent," of fasting and repentance, was initiated by the church Apostles very early in Christian history. However, "the best modern scholars are almost unanimous in rejecting this view, for in the existing remains of the first three centuries we find both considerable diversity of practice regarding the fast before Easter and also a gradual process of development in the matter of its duration. The passage of primary importance is a letter of St. Irenaeus to Pope Victor in connection with the Easter controversy. There Irenaeus says that there is not only a controversy about the time of keeping Easter but also regarding the preliminary fast. Irenaeus states: 'Some think they ought to fast for one day,



others for two days, and others even for several, while others reckon forty hours both of day and night to their fast" (from the Catholic Encyclopedia.). There were debates in the church, about when to celebrate Easter, what a season of fasting might look like, and more. In other words, practices developed and changed. While I am actually quite a traditionalist in many ways, I also recognize that change must occur as we seek to help people in their faith journeys today.

I can remember different Lent practices we had growing up. What we did isn't as important as the fact that I can remember my family, my church, and me "keeping the fast" through our religious and faith practices. Through worship, prayer, and study I was reminded that this time was important. This is a time to dwell on what it means to be a disciple of the one who would bear the cross.

Change is inevitable. The goal of the season of Lent is that change might be encouraged in all of us. Repent literally means "to turn around." It means to CHANGE direction. What needs to change in your life?

Agape Circle



The Critical Importance Of Church Choirs

In an ever-changing world of congregational worship, studies show that church choirs are even more important than have been in our past. Studies show that an estimated 40% of mainstream churches and 21% of evangelical churches have stopped using church choirs in the past 20 years. However, 37% of mainstream churches and 35% of evangelical churches continue to use church choirs today in their worship services.

Here are sevens reasons why church choirs are still of great importance in congregational worship today.

- 1. The Book of Psalms is filled with instructions on singing in church, and is a hymnal for the New Testament church. If we say they are irrelevant, we risk forsaking a rich Biblical tradition of singing.
- Choirs encourage good worship from the congregation. Choirs help to lead hymns/service music from the choir loft. Those that have support in singing often feel more supported and sing out more than without this support.
- 3. Choirs offer participants a way to share their God-given Talents in the service of our Lord.
- 4. Choirs help to inspire and lead in worship. Most churches have done away with hymnals that have four part harmony and now simply sing unison hymns/praise songs. Congregations yearn for more than dumbed down worship.
- 5. Choirs can be reaffirming to their members and not just the high profile singers. Everyone wants to feel they are valued and offer something during worship. When a choir sings, it's about the choir and not an individual single person.
- 6. Choir teaches us to work together and learn from one another. People have so many differences, but choir encourages them to work together for a common cause, putting those differences aside.
- 7. Choir encourages music diversity. Singing the same thing every Sunday tends to be a drag. Choirs are able offer different genres/styles of music that spice things up. As our Pastor says, "we need more cowbell."

We are so fortunate to have a wonderful parish choir at St. Andrew's, filled with those that freely share their talents each week. They spend time Wednesday evening each week rehearsing music to enhance our services. Please let our choir know how much you appreciate their efforts each week.

We are suspending yoga classes throughout the Lenten season so everyone can attend Wednesday evening Lenten services. Yoga classes will resume on Wednesday, April 15.





What is a Deacon?

I am called to serve in the ELCA as a Minister of Word and Service or Deacon. Some of you may remember that when I was called to St. Andrew's in 2010 my title or roster was "Associate in Ministry," and there was an ELCA Churchwide vote to merge three previous rosters (including mine) into one of Ministers of Word and Service or Deacons. This change took effect in January 2017, and there is still more work being done to clarify and make decisions related to this new roster.

The ELCA Church Council approved the symbols of this ministry to be a Deacon Stole (diagonal stole) and Cross (design yet to be determined). Their work also recommended that the entrance rite for Ministers of Word and Service would be ordination (formerly was consecration). This recommendation was passed at the ELCA Churchwide Assembly in August 2019. So now, I am an ordained Minister of Word and Service.

Although some Deacons in the ELCA have already been wearing Deacon Stoles in their ministry context, I have been waiting for Churchwide approval. You will begin to see me wearing one in worship leadership in the coming months. For me, this is a visible sign of my ministry role and calling to serve as a Minister of Word and Service in the ELCA.

Council Highlights

Opening

Curtis Amick called the meeting to order at 7 p.m.

Council approved the minutes of the January Council meeting.

Curtis shared a devotion; Pastor Trump led a discussion of Chapter 6 of Rethinking Church Governance.

Pastor's Report and Deacon's Report

The Pastor's report and Deacon's report were accepted as presented. Sandra Holland reported that Christine Vincent and the youth have developed good rapport and the new staffing arrangement is working well.

Team Reports

Finance: Tom Henry presented a detailed list of loan options for the narthex renovation and new HVAC system(s) if obtaining a loan to complete the project(s) is to be considered. Tom addressed initial questions and concerns about project and funding priorities. Pastor Trump reminded Council that consultant Mike Ward is optimistic about the church's capacity to support the projects and will work with Council on financial planning and fund raising.

Property: Tom Bane and Jay Folk reported that the replacement of the current HVAC systems with a new, different system of air handling that includes individual units in each room in the Sunday school wing is no longer under consideration, as engineering measurements revealed incompatibility of proposed equipment and building design. The Property Team has requested a new proposal and cost estimate from Mechanical Design Inc. based on an alternative plan.

Unfinished Business

Narthex/Parlor Project

Pastor Trump reported that, combined with available monies in the worship furnishing fund, the narthex fund is within goal, thanks to gifts by members of the congregation. Attention to immediate HVAC needs may delay the start of the project.

HVAC Project

Council determined that any further deliberations regarding HVAC system replacement will be postponed until a new estimate for all phases of that project is in hand. Council approved a motion to postpone decision-making on both the renovation and HVAC projects until a called Council meeting on Sunday, Feb. 23, when more information about costs is in hand.

Council anticipates making specific decisions on Feb. 23 regarding project funding (loan and gift solicitation options), presentation to the congregation for approval, and scheduling. In the meantime, Council members will obtain final cost estimates from the Boudreaux Group for renovation work and sanctuary carpeting installation; Mechanical Design Inc. will submit a new proposal and cost estimate; Tom Henry will discuss financial options with the Finance Team; and Pastor Trump will seek guidance on next steps from Mike Ward.

New Business

Council tabled a motion to supplement grant monies with up to \$9,000 from savings for the summer 2020 Dramarama program. Pastor Trump continues to seek additional grant awards. A Vision 2020 Committee is being formed to work with The Rev. Mike Ward to begin a visioning and strategic planning process for St. Andrew's. The committee will include two Council members and three at-large members of the congregation.

The Faithful Innovation Team reminded council of the March 8, 2020 lunch with Karen Baptist Church, and asked for monetary support in providing the meal. The Worship & Fellowship Team will spend up to \$250, and council members will provide desserts. The Property Team agreed to plant a tree with a plaque in honor of Karen Baptist, who worship in our space Sunday afternoons.

Council approved a motion to spend up to \$600 from the Undesignated Memorial Fund for the purchase and installation of a TV + DVD player for the Sojourners' classroom.

Council approved a motion to postpone until its March meeting a discussion of changing Council meeting protocol. Pastor Trump adjourned with prayer concerns.
