
A Word from Pastor Trump

What does the future hold?

This is another article that must begin by saying "we just do not know." Your church staff, congregational council, and other leaders are working hard to arrive at answers. The world is going to be operating differently for some time and churches certainly will continue to be affected. There are many questions about worship.

When will we worship again in person? We do not know.

Who is making the decision? A task force with staff, doctors from our church, and the council president.



What factors are being considered? We are informed by Synod and ELCA recommendations, as well as information from DHEC, CDC and more. There is a lot of information out there. We have agreed that we will not worship in person before there is a 14 day "downturn" in the numbers. We have asked the doctors on the task force to help decipher the statistics.

What will change in worship? Possibly a great deal. The following changes are likely:

- There may be an extra worship service, so that we can LIMIT the number of people in the sanctuary at any time. We will have to get people to "commit" to which service they plan to attend.
- Seats will be marked off so that we sit apart from those who are not in our families.
- We will ask people to wear masks.
- We will ask people to not gather and talk after church except at safe distances.
- We will not pass the peace physically.
- Offering will be at the door so that the plates are not passed from hand to hand.
- Everything will be in your bulletins so that we do not touch hymnals.
- Singing may be extremely limited if there is any at all. This sounds drastic but the statistics about the spread of particles while singing are significant.
- There will be no choir for now. Rehearsals are too risky.
- Communion will be in the aisle, one at a time with pre-poured cups.
- We must remind people that if they are uncomfortable taking communion at this time they are in no way required to do so. God is gracious.
- Surfaces that can be touched will be cleaned between services.

Will we continue to offer a recorded service? Yes. All people may not feel comfortable coming to worship in person. In fact, we hope to continue some sort of recorded service long term.

As your pastor I must stress that if anyone is uncomfortable coming to worship that we respect that decision, and in no way are pressuring people to do so. Help us to know who you are so that we can continue to reach out in other ways.

What about other activities in the church? Until we are worshipping in person there will be no other activities held in the church. What about other groups after we are in worship together? What about other groups then? Groups such as Lutheran Men, WELCA, and quilters may make their own decisions but are asked to follow all social distancing guidelines.

Cares Act Support

We are pleased to report that St. Andrew's Lutheran Church has been approved to receive more than \$56,000 in funding through the federal government's Payroll Protection Program (the PPP). The PPP is a component of the larger Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES Act) intended to allow small businesses to retain employees during the economic downturn caused by the coronavirus and the related shutdowns. The proceeds come in the form of a loan, but, if the funds are used for payroll (i.e. employee retention), utilities, and mortgage interest during the eight-week period following the loan's inception, the full amount of the loan will be forgiven. Our intention is to keep all staff members on payroll for the time being and, accordingly, the loan should be forgiven, essentially making it a federal grant. Thanks to those involved in securing this funding for the church.

While we are grateful for the federal support, it does not cover all of our ongoing expenses. During this time please remember to continue to support your church. Your gifts make possible all the ways we are working to remain connected and offer worship, study, community, and care. You may give online, or simply mail in a check. It has never been easier to make your contributions electronically and you can set up automatic recurring gifts and review your online giving history from anywhere you have internet access. Of course, if you have been directly affected financially by this pandemic, our prayers are with you, and your church understands if under those circumstances someone's giving must drop off.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Friends: I am a newspaper editor, but I wanted to write a "letter to the editor" for our church. I wanted to talk about what I am receiving from on-line Bible study at this time. Pastor Trump's Wednesday evening Bible study sessions create a needed respite for me from the anxiety and isolation of coronavirus. The weekly gatherings temper my obsession with the latest COVID-19 case numbers or alarming discoveries and remind me again of God's love and presence. The meetings also cause me to consider in new and deeper ways the scriptures I have read for years. Last week, one of the regular participants mentioned he had been nervous about the sessions because he doesn't have a scholarly understanding of scriptures. His words captured my apprehension and, I suspect, of others in the class. I have come to believe that we're all seeking the same thing, to hear what God may be telling us in this day and time. I find few silver linings in our global pandemic. But I have been able to walk more (I've lost 15 pounds!) and to finish a 1,000+ page book. I'm also able to participate in the 6 p.m. Wednesday Bible study. If I had to drive somewhere to attend, I couldn't make it. But now, I'm completing my workday just a few minutes before the study starts. It's been a blessing in these challenging times. - *Paul Osmundson*

Family Promise News

St. Andrew's Lutheran was scheduled to host families in the Family Promise Program the week of May 10 - 17. Obviously, we weren't able to host families, but Family Promise has continued to serve and help families experiencing homelessness and in need of support.

St. Andrew's has donated \$600 to Family Promise to help cover hotel and food costs for the families in the Family Promise Program. This represents what the church would have spent hosting the families had they stayed in the church during our designated host week.

Just like numerous other organizations, Family Promise needs financial assistance. They were able to qualify for the COVID 19 paycheck protection program, but their main fundraiser, the Family Promise Gala, was postponed. Many of us have been hurt economically during this time, but there are those of us who have not.

Church Council - May 14, 2020

Opening

Curtis Amick called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Council met via Zoom.

Council approved the minutes of the April 16, 2020, meeting.

Council approved the agenda as amended.

Whanna Bouknight shared a devotion.

President's Report

Curtis Amick, Council Chair, reported that he and church staff, the worship team chair, and Drs. Claire Birdsong and Donna Ray have been meeting to discuss factors involved in deciding when to open the building for in-person worship and subsequent safety measures. He reported that the group agrees that when we are able to gather again, worship and music will look and feel different in ways that are meant to ensure the safety of worshippers and staff. Upon advice from this advisory group, Pastor Trump has determined that no small or large groups will gather at the church at least until the congregation is worshipping in the building again, at which point individual groups will decide whether or not they feel safe meeting in person.

Pastor's Report and Deacon's Report

The Pastor's report and Deacon's report were accepted as presented.

Both Pastor Trump and Deacon Holland have continued to lead/attend many Bible studies, Sunday school studies, youth gatherings, Lutheran Men meetings, and other small group ministries remotely, using Zoom.

Work on our visioning/strategic planning process and stewardship planning with consultant Mike Ward have continued in Zoom meetings.

Tom Bane reported that seven people have volunteered to clean the sanctuary and other common areas between services once we are worshipping in the building again.

Pastor Trump reported on his continuing pastoral care in the case of emergencies including visiting some in person when it is possible to maintain safe distances.

Council discussed identifying people who don't come back to worship right away when we're back in the building because they are not comfortable being in proximity to many others, and the need to ensure they have access to virtual, recorded worship.

Deacon Holland reported that the S.C. Synod has advised congregations to not hold VBS events in person this summer. Sandra is looking into alternative VBS delivery methods. The Education Committee is preparing and sending Sunday school lessons to all families with children.

Communications

The Communications Committee has been working to identify any members having difficulty accessing technology that will allow them to enjoy worship and other church activities. Beth Mullins reported that those she has spoken to seem content with the access they do have but some are concerned about the effect social distancing practices will have in the life of the church.

Finance

Giving for April was \$3,015 less than actual expenses and \$9,165 less than budgeted expenses. While this is not unexpected given the circumstances, Council discussed a need to continue promoting online giving. The (forgivable) loan from the federal government will be helpful in maintaining payroll and making utility payments.

Property Report

Tom Bane reported that a windstorm damaged gutters on the Education wing, and water damage to the structure was revealed when the gutters were removed from the building. Council passed a motion from the Property Committee to approve contracting with Baker Roofing and spending up to \$6,000 to correct the water damage and related problems.

Worship Committee

Pastor Trump reported that the Worship Committee has decided to offer John Slice a thank-you gift for his work producing our worship videos since mid-March and suggested that he receive compensation for his work moving forward. Council approved a motion to employ John Slice with a salary of \$100 per week for as long as he continues to film and produce the videos, beginning June 7. The Worship Committee, staff, and Council will be exploring options for continuing to offer a recorded worship service every Sunday even after the church has opened for in-person worship.

Pastor Trump adjourned with prayer concerns.
