PASTOR'S PAGE

Bible Reflection

Since we are people who profess to live by God's word, I thought some consideration of that word might be interesting. We are studying the book of Deuteronomy. There are very interesting passages, some deeply troubling ones, and many that directly apply to our lives as Christians. How and WHY are we called to honor the Sabbath? WHY are we asked to give back to God what we have first been given us? This critical book of the Bible talks about both, repeatedly. Look up Chapter 14 and read it. Here is what my commentary says about these matters.

Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy.

Deuteronomy 14

From The New Interpreter's Bible Commentary: To "observe the sabbath day to keep it holy" (5:12), therefore, was not simply a convenient way of enjoying a break within a busy routine. It was, rather, the acknowledgement of the immense mystery and inescapability of the passage of time. It was, in its link to the story of creation a recognition of the crestedness of time and of the distinction between the "now" of present human experience and the "then" and "hereafter" that can only be thought about, but never actually experienced. So the marking and observance of the sabbath by prayer and rest from work formed the simplest and most basic of distinctions that shaped and ordered the temporal world" (p.403).

And regarding our giving back to God:

Deuteronomy 14

From The New Interpreter's Bible Commentary: "The tithe undoubtedly had very ancient origins, serving both as a gift and, more important, as an act of consecration. It maintained the orderliness and integrity of the cycle of life. And it expressed the return to God of some part of what the worshipper had received from God, since, just as some of the crop had to be retained for see, so also some further part had to be handed back for the use of the divine giver. So the tithe came to fulfill many significant purposes. It reminded the worshiper that, in harvesting the crops or counting the offspring of flocks and herd, there had occurred an act of receiving and not simply of producing. The worshiper had participated in a life-sustaining cycle in which her or she had co-operated, but over which only God had ultimate control" (p.403).

MINUTES St. Andrew's Lutheran Church Congregational Council meeting May 13, 2021 7:00 p.m.

- Curtis Amick called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m.
- Beth Hutchison led the devotions.
- Council approved the minutes of the April 15, 2021, meeting.
- Council approved the agenda as submitted.

President's Report

Justin Vargo discussed potential issues with the lower-level HVAC replacement in the education wing. The previous system had an underground return air duct made of brick and concrete. The system was installed when the building was constructed. Water was discovered in the duct system during installation of the new HVAC system. The water was pumped out, but some remains. The plan is to monitor the humidity levels, and if they stay low with the current pump, the duct system will probably be okay. If humidity levels rise, something else may need to be done. No action was requested on the system during the meeting.

The Pastor's Report was submitted and accepted.

The Deacon's Report was submitted and accepted. Sandra noted that the church plans to have in-person Bible School during the third week of July. Most of the activities will held outdoors.

Team Reports

The Mutual Ministry Team

recommended the council approve an updated job description for the youth ministry position. Tom Henry made a motion to accept the job description and Beth Hutchison seconded it. The description was approved on a voice vote with no objection.

The committee reported that on behalf of SALC, the committee made the following donations:

- Homeless No More (\$500) Offers shelter to homeless families.
- Free Medical Clinic (\$1,500) Supplies medical services to those in our community who cannot otherwise afford treatment.
- Cooperative Ministry (\$500) Provides a variety of services and resources to families in need.
- Washington Street United Methodist Church Soup Kitchen (\$500) Ministers to hungry people in the downtown area
- Harvest Hope Food Bank (\$500) Distributes food to people in need.
- Family Promise (\$500) Provides shelter, food and hope for a better future for families experiencing homelessness.

Unfinished business

Church bus: Beth Mullins reported that she spoke to the pastor of Hope Church about the possibility of the church acquiring the St. Andrew's bus. The pastor was non-committal. She will ask Lutheran Services if it is interested in the bus.

Deacon Sandra Holland led the council in prayer for congregational members and others facing challenges or concerns.

Family Promise General Update

Family Promise has four families in the program – three in the triplex and one in the transitional home. All four families are doing well. The new family that joined the program in May is adjusting well. The mom will soon be going back to school to complete her education degree. The focus for the children of all the families is on transitioning from the school year to the summer -- with the goal being a combination of academic and social activities for them during the summer months.

Lunch & Learn meetings are held monthly for Day Center Volunteers (DCV). The meetings are currently focused on learning more about the local agencies to which our DCV's refer callers who are looking for shelter or other assistance. The May meeting featured Sistercare and lunch was donated by Jason's Deli. Anyone interested in becoming DCV or who want to know more about the featured agencies are welcome to join in person or via Zoom. Meeting information will be shared prior to the June Lunch & Learn.

The future of Family Promise

Jeff Armstrong, Executive Director of Family Promise of the Midlands, has announced that the triplex – which is a static housing model - is an annual lease agreement that began February 1, 2021. Also, as we emerge from the pandemic, the current guidance from HUD & the CDC discourages congregant living arrangements like the rotational model. Therefore, the static model will continue for the foreseeable future. It is unknown when, or even if, Family Promise will return to the rotational model.
