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PASTOR'S PAGE

FROM PT:

Read any good books lately? WE HAVE. Our Bible study just dove into (pun intended) Jonah. Now, here's why it's a great story to study. First, a joke:

A teacher was teaching her class about whales. She said that it was physically impossible for a whale to swallow a human being as even though it was a gigantic animal, its stomach was very small. A little girl put up her hand and said that Jonah was swallowed by a whale. Irritated, the teacher insisted that a whale couldn't possibly swallow a human. The little girl said, "When I get to Heaven, I'll ask Jonah." The teacher replied, "What if Jonah went to Hell?" The girl said, "Then you ask him."

And here's the problem. There are those who think that if you don't accept all of the Bible as factually and scientifically and historically true and accurate, if you don't "swallow" the whole thing hook line and sinker, then you are going to be judged accordingly.

HOWEVER equally guilty are people who sneer at others who DO CHOOSE to embrace God's word in this way! As long as no one is forcing science teachers what to teach, what is the problem here?


We started our study of Jonah by recognizing three ways to approach it. First, you may choose to believe it happened as it is written. Period.

Second, maybe there was a real Jonah, called to go to Nineveh, who got let's say, thrown overboard, hung onto a raft, made it to land, and either told the best fish story ever, or was dehydrated and delusional. Either way, he ended up in Nineveh and the people did repent.

Third, you may choose to see the story as just that: A story. It is still a story told by God. Jonah helps us explore a most critical issue: how do we read scripture? We can appreciate a variety of approaches.

Which brings us to the most important point. No matter which way you approach the story, there is truth behind it. God's truth. The literal truth. Like Jonah we are called to proclaim God's word of repentance and change to all God's people. Like Jonah, we often run away from this command. Like Jonah, God does redeem us from our fishy graves and calls us again to do what we have been asked to do. Like the people of Nineveh we are called to repent, to turn over a new leaf. Maybe most importantly, like Jonah at the end, we often resent God's grace shown to others.

A Capital Funds Campaign for **St. Andrew's Lutheran Church**

An update from Georgia Godfrey on the WE GATHER capital campaign for St. Andrew's:

Ready, Set, Go!

We are READY: We have been preparing, planning, discerning, and getting ready for quite some time. The project teams have worked diligently to create outlines for each part of the project and gather estimates. As a congregation, we have had time to hear about the plans for each area, ask questions to learn more, and dream about the ways that these changes to our facility will create opportunities for us to grow in our relationships with God, with each other, and with the community.

We are SET: We officially kicked off this campaign in October, and collectively, the people of St. Andrew's have pledged to make contributions over the next 2 years totaling over 90% of the campaign goal. There is a buzz of excitement and positive energy as we round the bend from project planning into project construction.

Let's GO: At this time, the balance in the WE GATHER Capital Campaign fund is enough to fully fund 2 out of 3 projects. We will continue to add to that balance to fulfill our pledges over the next two years and meet or exceed our goal of \$500,000. On January 12th, our church council discussed moving forward with a congregational meeting to recommend and vote on a motion to approve the expenditure of the WE GATHER Capital Campaign funds for the completion of the projects outlined in the campaign.

Are you ready to see these projects become a reality? Here we go!

The Campaign Steering committee is developing a timeline, and we are excited to get these projects started! The architects overseeing the Narthex/Sanctuary/Gathering Area project anticipate a start date in late spring or early summer. The kitchen updates will likely begin even earlier. We are thankful for the faithful, generous giving that puts us in position to fully fund these two projects without borrowing any money! We intend to move forward with the parking lot once the first two projects are completed or far enough along that there will not be heavy construction equipment coming and going. We are optimistic that the Capital Campaign fund will continue to receive contributions, and we will be able to cover the parking lot costs without borrowing.

Thank you for your gifts, your efforts, and your enthusiasm as we continue on this journey together.

COMING OUT AT NIGHT FOR WORSHIP WITH CHILDREN

It can be tough! Parents, you have to go get them. Maybe you are at work. Maybe they are at school. Maybe they are scattered about. When is bedtime and what homework and chores have to be done? You're just trying to be a good and responsible parent! And you are!

HOWEVER...however... Coming to worship in the evening is a tremendous opportunity to give your child or children a most critical and essential message in life's journey. What is it that is MOST important? Do we put other things aside for a little while to be in worship?

How does your church try to help?

First and foremost, with food. You will notice that there are meals, less expensive than you could provide elsewhere, before almost all evening worship services.

Second: Schedule. We have moved the supper time up to 5:45 p.m., shortened the eating time, and moved most evening worship services to 6:30 p.m. All of this is to help parents and kids!

Third: Worship. The evening worship services during Lent are tremendously different, full of movement and symbolism that intrigues children, and for five Wednesdays we have dramas that hold their attention.

So imagine the ride home after worship. Yes, the children are tired. There may be one homework assignment still to be done, but from the back seat you hear one say: Mom, Dad... Grandpa, Grandma... Auntie... Tell me about the ashes on the forehead again? Tell me about the candle? In that play, why was the man upset again? The opportunities for growth in faith, and in your own relationships are endless.

PS. Yes, it might cut into TV time... But you can record all that or skip it!

SHROVE TUESDAY, February 21, 5:45 p.m. Pancake Supper

We anticipate Lent with SHROVE TUESDAY. This is the traditional day before Ash Wednesday when people "feast" before the "fast." They "use up" all their fat and flour in preparation for going without during Lent. This means you eat pancakes, or if you come from a German heritage,

maybe from Pennsylvania, you eat Fastnachts which are a type of doughnut. This is the party before the time of contemplation and devotion, so there is Mardi Gras in New Orleans and elsewhere with music dancing and oh so much more. Join your church for a more tame but fun Shrove Tuesday pancake supper. There will be fun games for all ages. Will you enter the Pancake Race?

ASH WEDNESDAY, February 22, Noon and 6:30 p.m. (please note the time)

Ash Wednesday is a solemn reminder of human mortality and the need for reconciliation with God and marks the beginning of the penitential Lenten season. It is commonly observed with ashes and fasting. It is recognized in the vast majority of Christian traditions, while its themes have strong Jewish roots. It is a most moving and important day in our faith journeys. Parents, this is a wonderful opportunity to teach children and deepen their faith as well. Pastor Trump will offer a moment to talk with children after church about what they have experienced.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

January 12, 2023

Anna Berger called the council meeting to order at 7:00pm, and led devotions.

Brian Teusink requested a correction be made to the minutes of the December Council meeting. He then made a motion to approve the minutes, as corrected. After Beth Mullins seconded the motion, the minutes were unanimously approved.

We Gather Capital Campaign Update: The Campaign Steering Team met and announced that as of Jan. 7, 2023, the balance of the fund account is \$341,090, which includes \$254,911 in fulfilled pledges. Additional pledges of \$112,504 will be added over the next two years, bringing the grand total to \$453,594. The Team recommends that the funds on hand be used this year for the inside building projects and defer the parking lot upgrade to a point in the future when sufficient pledges have been made to cover the cost, avoiding the possibility of incurring a loan for any of the work. Specifically, the Team recommends the following plan:

Beginning Summer 2023: The Boudreaux Group will serve as the Project Manager for the most extensive renovation: narthex/sanctuary/gathering area. They will accept construction bids prior to the projected start. The estimated cost is \$242,000, which is on hand in the We Gather Fund.

Beginning Spring 2023 (after Easter): The Fellowship Hall kitchen renovation will be a hybrid project using volunteers for demolition and licensed professionals for reconstruction (to include electric/gas, plumbing, cabinetry, flooring, and appliance installation). Church member Justin Varco has agreed to provide oversight for this project. The estimated cost is \$78,000, which is on hand in the We Gather Fund.

Beginning once funds are received in the We Gather account: Parking lot restoration, with an estimate of \$110,000. The Team recommends that Council call a special Congregational meeting where a vote will be taken to approve the expenditure of the We Gather Capital Campaign funds, for the completion of the projects outlined in the campaign and as more thoroughly described above. The projects are the Narthex/Sanctuary/Gathering Area, kitchen, and parking lots. Council expressed support for this Congregational action and, unanimously passed the Team's recommendation, setting the date for the special Congregational meeting for Sunday, January 29, 2023 at 10:20 a.m.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Finance: Brian Teusink reported that, due to exceptional giving during the month of December, total Current & Benevolent revenue was only \$1,700 below the 2022 Ministry Plan. He indicated that this is a very positive indicator of the Congregation's support of the ministry plan. Mr. Teusink noted that, unusual expenses incurred during 2022 (repairs to septic system, significant landscaping undertaken, purchase of a new lawn mower and other equipment, etc.) resulted in expenses exceeding giving by approximately \$8,700 and spending exceeding the ministry plan by nearly \$7,000.

President Berger reported that Church Treasurer, Judy Venturella, will be available at 6:30 p.m. on February 16 (1/2 hour prior to the start of the February Council meeting), to provide an overview of financial reports and church accounting procedures. She encouraged all new Council members, and any returning members seeking additional understanding of the Church's financial operations, to attend.

Property: Pastor Trump, referring to the committee report, reported that a leak has been identified in the roof of the sanctuary, noting that church member Tom Bane is addressing the situation.

Social Ministry: Ingrid Driggers submitted a written report for the agenda packet, outlining the various financial and volunteer contributions during 2022.

Stewardship: Pastor Trump reported that letters to congregation are being mailed this week, with pledge cards for 2023 giving. He noted that the letters are customized based on whether the congregant has pledged in the past, has given without pledging, has not given through trackable means, or fall into another category.

Mr. Teusink requested that, at a future date, Council conduct in depth discussion about estate planning and how the Church can more effectively address this topic.

Old Business: President Berger reminded Council that the Council Retreat will be held at the church on the evening of January 27 from 6 until 9 p.m. and on the morning of January 28 from 8:30 a.m. until noon.

New Business:

- Sandra Holland and Beth Mullins gave information on the updating of the church website. It is anticipated to "go live" in February 2023.
- Council agreed that beginning in March, monthly Council meetings will be called to order at 6:30 p.m.
- Council agreed that the next round of quarterly team meetings will be conducted on February 26, 2023, immediate following the 10:30 a.m. service.
- Council agreed to redirect \$200 from the Office Manager salary line item to Nancy Gibbons for her work on
- assembling and editing the 2023 Lenten Devotional book.
- To facilitate meetings in which some are participating remotely through Zoom (or other digital means), Sandra Holland motioned for Council to approve the purchase of a Meeting Owl, using funds from the Undesignated Memorials account, not to exceed \$1200. Anna Berger seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Souper Bowl of Caring: Sandra Holland motioned that Council approve the annual collection of donations for this event, being held this year on February 12. Darrick Williams seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Sandra Holland motioned that donated funds collected for the Souper Bowl of Caring event on February 12, 2023 be designated to the Virginia Wingard Methodist Church Food Pantry. Anna Berger seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Sandra Holland motioned that the Souper Bowl of Caring special collection be authorized for all future years, or until such authorization is revoked by Council, and delegating responsibility for funds collected to the Social Ministry committee to disburse at its discretion. Whanna Bouknight seconded the motion, which was unanimously passed.

Pastor Trump led Council in prayer.

SOCIAL MINISTRY CORNER

On behalf of *your church*, the Social Ministry Team made the following donations in December:

- Homeless No More (\$500) Offers shelter and emergency assistance to families in crisis.
- Free Medical Clinic (\$1,000) Supplies medical services to those in our community who cannot otherwise afford treatment.
- Cooperative Ministry (\$1,000) Provides emergency assistance to families in crisis.
- Senior Resources (\$500) Gives resources and assistance to Midlands area senior citizens.
- Dickerson Children's Advocacy Center (\$500) Provides treatment services to physically and sexually abused children.
- Harvest Hope (\$500) Feeds our community's disadvantaged people.
- Washington Street United Methodist Church Soup Kitchen (\$1,000) A long-term ministry of feeding hungry people.
- Resurrections (\$1,000) Our feeding partner with those who are experiencing homelessness. They also provide clothing and other services to those in need.
- Walter's Residential Care (\$500) A facility for low income, mentally challenged adults.

The Angel Tree project was a great success. Thanks to all who contributed.

Family Promise week was the week of Christmas. We provided compensation for the triplex that houses three families along with several meals for the week.

On December 21st St. Andrew's hosted a National Homeless Persons Remembrance Day service. We also prepared bag lunches for those who attended and gave leftovers to MIRCI (the Mental Illness Recovery Center) and Walter's Residential Care.

Be on the lookout for a Saturday lunch serving opportunity in the next couple of months!

We continue to collect food for the Virginia Wingard food bank throughout the year.

BUTTERFLIES FOR EASTER


