SUNDAY SCHOOL KICKOFF!

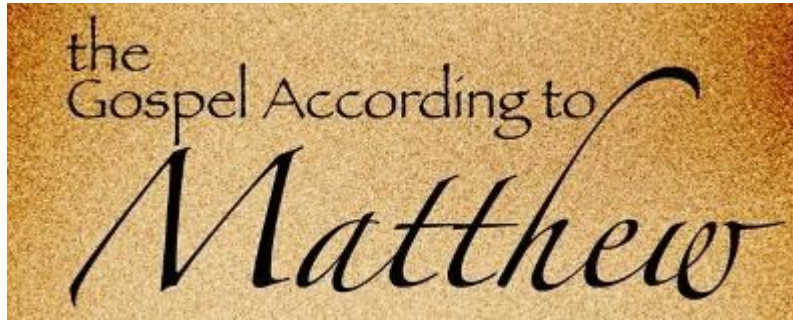

Do I have your attention? Sometimes I feel like that devil. We're just not getting through to people. About what? About BIBLE STUDY. Martin Luther said, "The Bible is the cradle wherein Christ is laid." To encounter God's word is to encounter Christ, and we do it more meaningfully together. The Apostle Philip was carried away by the Holy Spirit to meet with the Ethiopian who was reading from the prophet Isaiah. He was asked if he understood what he was reading, and his reply was, "How can I understand without someone to teach me." Philip went about teaching. On the road to Emmaus Jesus opened the scripture to the two men lost in their grief. I cannot stress enough the importance and joy of studying

scripture. And yet, we all too often leave it up to others.

The most amazing "excuse" I hear for NOT joining others in Bible study is, "I don't know enough about the Bible." Wait? Isn't that why we open the book? That's why I teach! And I love to teach the Bible and if I may say so, I'm pretty good at it. I am called, by you, to teach the Bible.

Some misnomers about Bible study.

- *I have to come to every class.* No, you do not. You will be invited to every class but people do miss.
- *I have to be there in person.* No, the Disciples Class is offered by Zoom on Wednesday evenings.
- *I have to answer all kinds of questions?* Yes, I will ask questions. That is a method of teaching, but it will be about what we just read. Questions are meant to teach, not make anyone feel inadequate.
- *All the other people are so smart about the Bible.* No, they aren't. Some know more than others. Everyone has some of their preconceptions challenged.

I will again offer two Bible studies beginning the third full week of August.

Retired and Restless: Meets on the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month at 11:00. We read and discuss the lessons for the upcoming Sunday. ALL ARE WELCOME.

Disciples Bible Study: Meets on Monday at 11:00 in person, and Wednesdays at 5:45 in person and via zoom. We will be starting a journey through the Gospel of Matthew. You will read and discuss the entire book. Anyone can join us any week or any class.

The famous theologian and philosopher Soren Kierkegaard once wrote: "The Bible is very easy to understand. But we Christians are a bunch of scheming swindlers. We pretend to be unable to understand it because we know very well that the minute we understand, we are obliged to act accordingly."

No, I don't think we are all a bunch of scheming swindlers. That's a little bit harsh. I think we often feel overwhelmed and don't want to add one more thing to our plate. But what could be more important than to read the Bible? To study the Bible? So please forgive the guilt trip. I'm just trying to get through to you, in order that God may get through to all of us through God's word!

FINANCIAL ACTIVITY ASSESSMENT 2022

Over the past several months, the finance team, led by Brian Teusink and comprised of Tracy Folk, Jason Godfrey, Tom Henry, Ruth Lackstrom, and Ron Walrath, has worked with Judy Venturella, (church Treasurer), and Sharon Berger, (financial Secretary) to conduct testing of Current & Benevolent financial activity for the year ending, December 31, 2022.

In general, the Current & Benevolent financial records of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church for 2022 were well maintained, accurately reflect the revenue received and expenditures paid. The financial statements presented to Congregation Council and the Congregation appropriately summarize these transactions/activity. Additionally, transactions are recorded in a timely manner. While immaterial errors were identified during testing, there was no indication of inappropriate, fraudulent, or systemic errors.

The finance team is recommending the appointment of a task force to evaluate the implementation of increased internal controls, recognizing that, in the small not-for-profit environment, the organization must strike a precarious balance between efficiency in making payments vs. implementing procedures to safeguard against the risk of misappropriation. This is especially true where the staff performing accounting functions are volunteers, uncompensated for their efforts.

JULY 13, 2023 CHURCH COUNCIL

Council President Berger called the council meeting to order at 6:40 pm.

Devotions: Jason Bradley

Opening Prayer: Derrick Williams

Minutes of the June Council meeting were approved.

We Gather Capital Campaign Update: President Berger referred to the We Gather Capital Campaign update that was included in the meeting materials. She noted that total contributions, plus pledges, exceed \$505,000. Ms. Berger reported that the renovations to the kitchen have been completed and that the total cost was within the projected budget.

Ms. Berger informed Council that, earlier in the day, a meeting was conducted with the capital projects team and representatives of the Boudreaux Group. She reported that, to the surprise of everybody involved, Richland County has not approved the construction permit, raising issues over the location and design of handicap restroom facilities.

Pastor Trump indicated that, per regulation, whenever construction requiring a permit takes place, the area being improved/constructed must be completed in a manner that all current building codes are met. He noted that the County is interpreting the building codes such that handicap compliant restroom facilities must be incorporated into the renovation. Pastor Trump opined that such a modification to the planned renovations would be both impractical and expensive.

President Berger indicated that the experts on the capital projects team, as well as the representatives from Boudreaux were surprised by the County's concerns and have questioned how the building codes are being interpreted by the County. She reported that a meeting with representatives of the County will be conducted next week to attempt to resolve the issue. Ms. Berger indicated, however, that until a resolution is found, the renovation will be delayed.

President's Report: The President submitted a written report that was included in the meeting materials. It was accepted as information with a notation that Pastor Trump would be seeking a second Thrivent grant to cover the remaining portion of costs associated with the August 21 community dinner at the Seminary.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Trump's written report was included in the meeting materials. It was accepted as information.

Deacon's Report: Deacon Holland's written report was included in the meeting materials and it was accepted as information.

Team Reports

Finance: Brian Teusink referred to the written report that was included in the agenda packet. He reported that year-to-date results continue to be satisfactory, but that the deficit continues to grow. Mr. Teusink noted that cash available for operations has declined to approximately \$116,500, a level that is acceptable, but which warrants monitoring. Mr. Teusink reported that, due to an oversight, the information to be shared with the congregation regarding the 2022 Financial Activity Assessment was left out of the July newsletter. He noted that it would be included in the August newsletter and that the delay was inconsequential.

Social Ministry, Stewardship, Children's Ministry reports were submitted and included in the meeting materials. They were received as information.

Old Business:

Strategic Vision/Goals: The ongoing discussion of the Vision and Goals document remains tabled until next month.

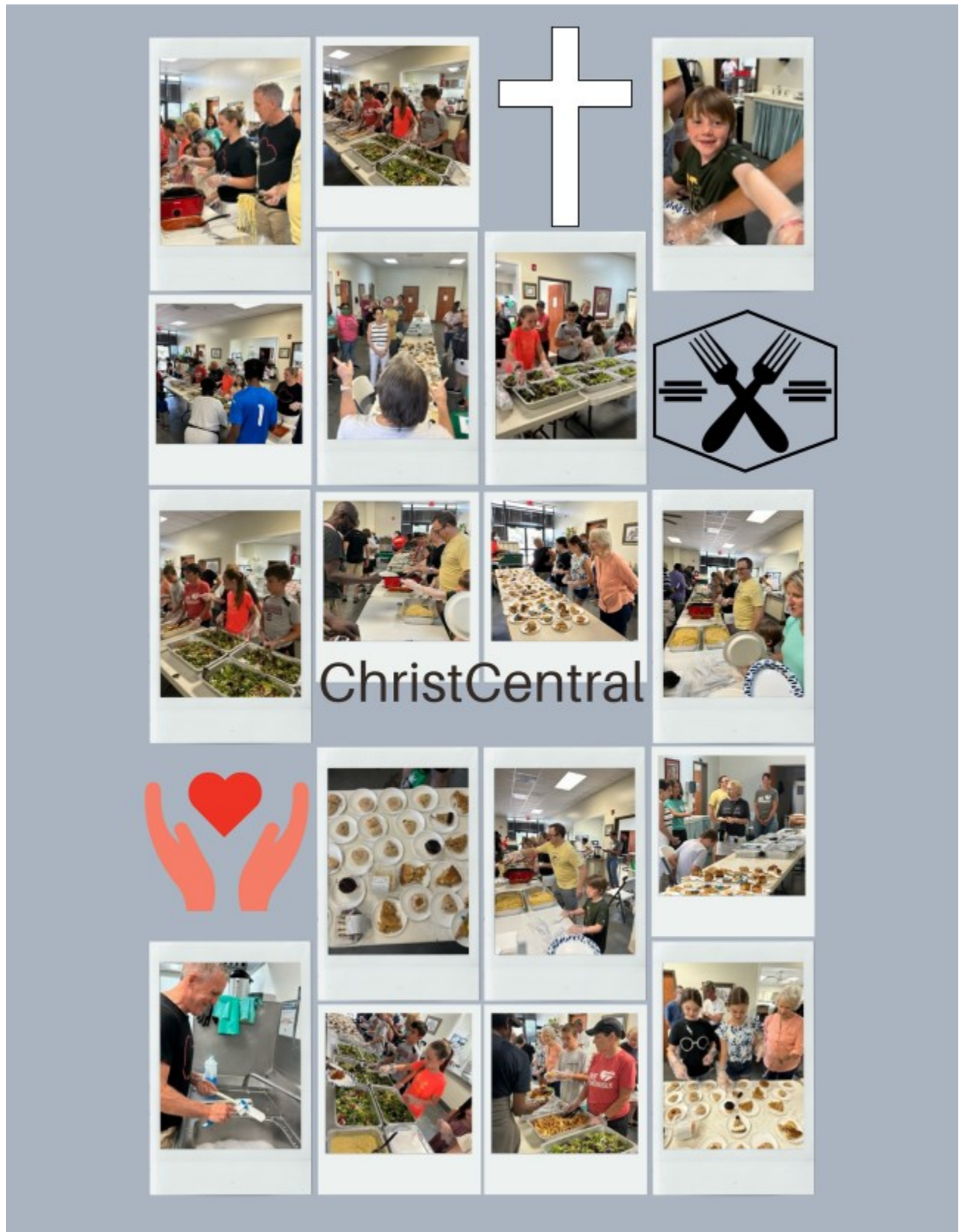

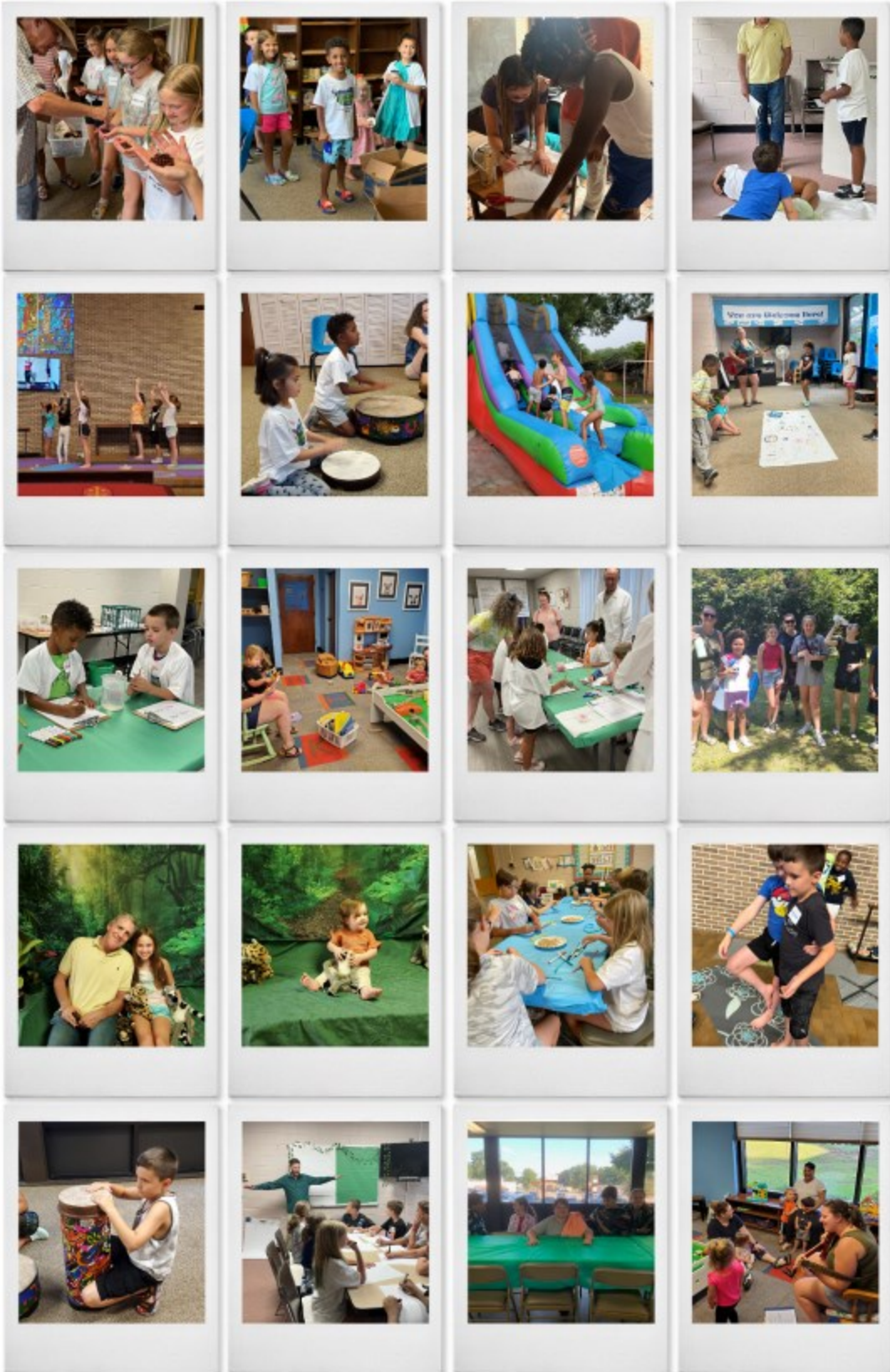

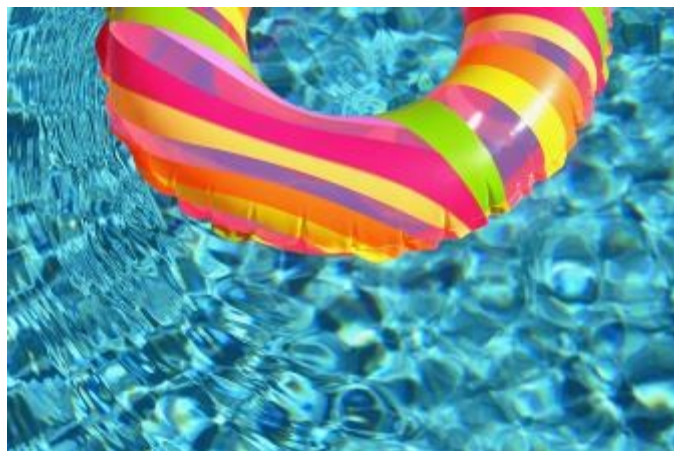
