
CHILDREN AND YOUTH CLASSES meet in person each Sunday at 9:30.

The community that I find here has been so helpful in my transition from the friends at seminary that I do not see as much anymore. Your continued graciousness to me means so much, it has aided in a somewhat jarring transition. As you may know, I have ventured out into something that kind of scared me to do. I am singing with the choir, and I am loving it! It is doing so much to awaken to me the gift of song and the depth it adds in praise.

My time with the Door Home and Stacey is continuing to open me up to worlds around me that I never took time to notice before. I am learning and seeing about

food insecurity and transportation needs and how things we take for granted sometimes are out of reach luxuries for others, which is causing me to be more grateful for the things I am blessed with. More than things though, I am learning the value of relationship on a deeper level. Many of those that I meet want someone to listen, to see them, to care about their lives. Prison chaplaincy for is still not ruled out but, also stirring in me is a desire to be a bridge that facilitates deeper and lasting relationships between the Church and the world around it. We have a great treasure given us called the Gospel, unlike the treasures here of Earth, this Gospel replenishes the more we share it! As I close, I thank you for your prayers and ask that they continue specifically as it pertains to moving into the stage where I am going to be learning the practical side (at least in a crash course) of getting ministries off the ground. I will be

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

FEBRUARY COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- *Georgia Godfrey called the Council meeting to order at 7:00pm using the Zoom conferencing platform.
- *Georgia Godfrey led the council in a devotion.
- *The council approved the minutes of the January 13, 2022, meeting with amended changes.
- *Georgia Godfrey presided as president due to Anna Berger's excused absence.
- *The President's, Pastor's, and Deacon's reports were accepted without questions.
- *The Intern's Report was accepted. Stephen did add that had a new understanding of prison ministry due to the accommodations made for COVID safety, of how to serve this ministry outside the prison walls.

Team Reports

Children's Ministry Team: A thorough report was included in the agenda.

Finance Team: A thorough report was included in the agenda. Brian Teusink announced that January 2022 giving was nearly \$4,300 up from January 2021 and exceeded expenditures by approximately \$2,000. This was approximately \$4,000 below the budgeted monthly amount; however, there are no major categories where spending exceeds the year-to-date budget. (continued on the following page)

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

Property: A thorough report was included in the agenda. There was discussion about security and lighting. Pastor Trump mentioned that the new lighting has greatly improved areas of the exterior that needed extra lighting. The lights are on photocells, providing automation and energy savings. Robbie Derrick provided an update and led a discussion about donating the church van to Crossroads Church, which provides transportation to refugee families to and from church and for special events.

A motion was made by Robbie and a second was made by Brian Teusink to donate the bus to the Crossroads Church. The motion passed unanimously.

Social Ministry: A thorough report was included in the agenda. Ingrid Driggers reported that social ministry is holding a day of service, In-As-Much, on Saturday, April 23, 2022. This is also Earth Day. She asked that each team in SALC discuss how they can participate on that day.

Stewardship Team: A report was included in the agenda. Beth Hutchison and Pastor Trump each described the key points made during the Jan. 28, 2022 Stewardship Symposium at LTSS.

Old Business

Pastor Trump led the discussion about the Capital Campaign to raise funds for potentially three large projects at SALC: the narthex and sanctuary, the parking lot, and the kitchen. There is already \$60,000 in the Capital Campaign budget which has a target goal of \$350,000. Each project has a team gathering information and data in order to present to council and the congregation later this year. It was recommended that the Gathering Area be included in the Narthex/Sanctuary portion of the project.

A motion was made by Georgia and a second was made by Robbie to conduct a capital campaign for SALC to raise money for the Narthex/Sanctuary, the parking lot, and the kitchen. The motion passed unanimously.

New Business

The South Carolina Synod Assembly will be held June 12 – June 14, 2022. Beth Trump has volunteered to attend as a congregant. Staff attending will be Pastor Trump and Sandra Holland. Stephen Abbott may attend as a visitor. If others would like to attend, please contact Pastor Trump.

Prayer Concerns

Pastor Trump mentioned several prayer concerns in the St. Andrew's family, other council members added prayer concerns. Pastor Trump led the Council in prayer.

The meeting was adjourned.


