INTERN CORNER

Grace and peace to you all here in the community of St. Andrew's as my journey with you continues. Internship continues to go well. My first big news is that I have finished the semester! I finished with a pass for Urban Columbia and an A in my preaching class. I have filled in for Pastor Trump, teaching Bible study a couple of times for both the Monday morning class and the Wednesday evening class. Coming up now for me is a chance to teach both the youth and kids. I look forward to the experience. May 7th, I attended a meeting to discuss the future of the Kairos prison ministry. Unfortunately, the institutions are still closed due to COVID, but who knows what the future may hold. What I did get from the meeting was the chance to talk with others with a passion for ministry to the incarcerated and had some fruitful conversation with both a prison chaplain and a formerly incarcerated person. What really struck me was the fact that the topic of cookies changing lives resurfaced frequently. Even in what seems to be something so little, God works and moves to reconcile. What a blessing you are for the ministry of baking and giving. I have been working to spark interest in this summer's Dramarama, reaching out to Christ Mission through Reverend Cannon, Serve and Connect in Columbia, Koinonia of Columbia, Building Better Communities of Columbia, and Living Springs Lutheran. Being aware that for some transportation is an issue, I am also looking into possibly being able to use shuttles a couple of these organizations possess. In addition to this, I am looking into a water themed service project that will occur during VBS, and will be taking larger role in visitations.

Outside of St. Andrew's, I have been working closely with Reverend Cannon, as Stacey is slowly starting to look at taking her social ministry closer to home in Irmo. Through Reverend Cannon, I have been introduced to Reverend Murray who pastors God's Church of Deliverance. He also heads Destiny House, an organization with a few properties that house recently released peoples. It may be that through this connection that I will be able to have opportunities to serve as a volunteer prison chaplain. Prayers for that to open would be appreciated. With Reverend Cannon, I will be looking at two ideas for ministry. One would be to take Celebrate Recovery into Destiny House. For those who may not be familiar with the program, Celebrate Recovery is a 12-step recovery program. I am also going to focused on a program called Never Ending Soup, which takes unused food and makes it into...well...soup that is used to feed those with food crises. In addition to all that, I have taken it upon myself to volunteer with Koinonia, centered in the Eau Claire area and is next door to the seminary. Currently I am volunteering as I can with the after-school programs and plan to assist with their Freedom School once my internship is over.

This internship has been such a great experience. I enjoy worshipping alongside this fantastic and welcoming community here at St. Andrew's and I appreciate you. I was going to add something about appreciating your (fill in the blank) but I appreciate you. Period. You are such a great community. I look forward to where the next leg of the journey leads me and to where God is leading me. I feel like I am growing so much and thank you all for helping me to grow along the way. KAREN BAPTIST CHURCH

KAREN BAPTIST CHURCH is back with us. On Sunday afternoons the people of the Karen Baptist Church are once again using our sanctuary so that they can worship. We are so glad that this works out for all of us. Who are these people? They are refugees fleeing persecution because they are a minority in Thailand. They came to us through the Lutheran Refugee Services. Many have stayed at our Welcome House.

The Karen hill tribe in Thailand are the largest ethnic minority group, with an estimated population of around 1,000,000. They originated from Tibet, moving south to Myanmar and northern Thailand. Today, the Karen hill tribe live in proximity to areas alongside the Thai-Myanmar border such as; Mae Hong Son, Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai and some in central Thailand.

Traditionally the Karen are animists, with a strong belief in the spirit world. The most important, are the spirits of “Land and Water” who control the productivity of the land and call upon the rice to grow. Today as many as 30% of the Karen in Thailand, have been converted to **Christianity** by missionaries throughout the years. For the converted, animism still plays an important part in village life though, with all villagers participating in spirit festivals.

Karen villages are scattered across the countryside of northern Thailand. They can be found in just about every province and district in northern Thailand, such as Chiang Mai, Chiang Rai, Mae Hong Son. Traditionally, the Karen people prefer to dwell in mountainous highland areas. Many traditional villages can still be found in remote areas of Thailand, where the Karen still live in primitive conditions in bamboo stilt houses.

The Karen are the only tribe in Thailand to own and work with elephants. They have a long standing history and relationship with elephants, who they used to work in the forests. They are famous as highly skilled mahouts, and in fact, most of the mahouts in the elephants camps in Chiang Mai today, are Karen hill tribe.

Unfortunately, there is a war for freedom in Myanmar. It has become a religious war.

“Educated Christians are at the forefront of the secessionist Karen movement. Christianity provides the ideological underpinning of Karen nationalism. At the same time, the camp provides a site for mobilization of young soldiers for the “revolution” of the Karen. This is why the camps provide dangerous sanctuaries: In various instances, Burmese military and DKBA soldiers were storming the camps, shelling the camps and burning houses and looking for KNLA-soldiers. Karen nationalism and Christianity are thus intimately intertwined, reinforcing each other. As Reverend Dr. Simon Saw, principle of *Kawthoolei* Maela Bible College puts it: “God’s plan is a mystery.” But in the refugee camp, “we can reorganize our people.” In addition, Reverend Simon notes that missionization in the refugee camp has been a big success for mission: Thousands of people have received the gospel. Moreover, the Karen Baptist convention has expanded all over the world as Karen refugees have been resettled in all countries that accept them. He shows me a poster with the numerical concentration of Karen communities in the United States, Canada, Australia, and Scandinavia, Netherlands. Reverend Simon notes that the leadership was looking forward to the dissolution of the camp after resettlement of the last refugee. Helas, new fighting and harsh poverty in Burma swept new waves of refugees into Thailand and into the camps. (Continued on next page)

KAREN BAPTIST CHURCH

As many of the villages in the free-fire-zone have been forcibly relocated, burned or totally destroyed, the Karen refugees cannot return to their home villages to which they are emotionally attached. Two million refugees in Thailand and hundreds of thousands of displaced people in Karen state need to organize their survival and reproduction in a hostile environment. Education is used to instill Karen national values in the children and youth. Education holds the future alive. Without education, the refugees are degraded to a life of “animals” that are restricted to eating and sleeping. Education is also hold alive in the embattled Karen state in Burma. Activists in Mae Sariang coordinate the preparation of schoolbooks that are distributed by volunteers who cross the border by foot to distribute them among displaced people in mobile “displaced” schools.”

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

St. Andrew's Lutheran Church

May 12, 2022 Church Council meeting at SALC conference room

- *Anna Berger called the Council meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Devotions were led by Sandra.
- *The next meeting will be held on June 16, 2022 at 7:00pm at the church.
- * Council moved to discussion of approving the minutes. Brian offered the following corrections:
 - Presenters from last month's meeting providing information about the capital campaign projects should be listed as "others present." This includes Tom Bane, Tom Henry, and Ruth Lackstrom.
 - Property costs not to exceed \$4,000 for lawn equipment needs to be taken from a specific line item – "ground maintenance".

Robbie motioned and John B. second that we approve the minutes from last meeting as amended. Council approved the minutes as amended.

President's Report, Pastor's Report, Deacon's Report, and Intern Report all submitted and accepted.

TEAM REPORTS

Children's Ministry Team submitted a written report for the agenda.

Financial report was submitted prior to the meeting and shared with council in the agenda packet. Brian gave a verbal review of the report. (continued on next page)

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

Property Team submitted a written report for the agenda.

Robbie shared that the foundation crack estimate for repair is \$3500.

Landscaping on the Elm Abode side will be completed in about a week.

Council discussed drainage problem by the lower door. Robbie is coordinating to see if that can be completed along with the other work that is being done on the foundation.

Robbie is working on contacting the person to complete the work on the refugee house panel box. Beth Trump has secured grant money from Good Shepherd to cover some of this expense.

Stewardship Team submitted a written report for the agenda.

Pastor Trump explained that the stewardship drive will occur early this year (around August) in order to conclude prior to the Capital Campaign kick-off.

Youth Team submitted a written report for the agenda.

Social Ministry Team - Ingrid offered a verbal report.

St. Andrew's Family Promise host week is next week, and volunteers are invited to help with meals. Beth Trump has been elected to the Family Promise board. Steve Slice may plan a Family Promise information luncheon in the fall.

A feeding the homeless event is scheduled for September 10th. More information about this event is forthcoming.

Council discussed how much people enjoyed the projects during Inasmuch.

OLD BUSINESS

Synod gathering – Sandra, Stephen, John T., Beth T. are planning to attend. Registration closes this week.

NEW BUSINESS

Youth mission fund - Sandra mentioned that the “youth mission fund” currently has about \$22,000 in it. This fund supports youth trips such as WOW, youth gatherings, etc. These funds have not been needed over the past couple of years, and therefore, the balance has grown quite a bit. Approximately \$350 a month are being contributed to the fund. Council discussed possible approaches to this.

Capital Campaign updates – The steering committee is meeting with along with members of the ask team and presentation team to focus the vision and language so that we have a clear consistent message. At this point, the group has discussed that our main message is “we gather” and we will connect all parts of the projects to the concept of gathering in community. After feedback council offered at our last meeting regarding carpeting design in the narthex plan, the architects working on the narthex design have been asked to offer alternative flooring/carpet ideas for consideration.

We hope to have more details from the kitchen committee at June's council meeting.

Council closed in prayer led by Pastor Trump and adjourned at 7:53 p.m.

The sprinkler system is being repaired. We also believe this will help with security issues. Down the road, plants can be put in if they are needed but for now we have a "clean slate."
