On Reformation Sunday, October 30, we will have a WE GATHER CELEBRATION luncheon where you will be given the opportunity to respond financially. You will receive a pledge form in the mail. You can give a one-time gift, make an estimate of giving for the next two years or both. As you hear about the four areas, please pray and think about your response. Empowered by the Spirit, we can raise the \$500,000 to cover the estimated cost, contingencies and inflation to revitalize these four areas.

Reconfiguring our narthex, parlor and gathering area:

Estimated Cost for Narthex, Parlor \$197,000; Gathering area \$25,000

Reasons to update

- Area is congested and Narthex hallway is difficult to maneuver.
- Need community space to have people interact at times such as coffee hour.
- Flooring needs replacing.
- Restrooms need updating.
- Wallpaper outside office in Gathering Area has mold and needs removing.

Plan of Action

- Work with Architect to reconfigure area and make more welcoming.
- Create better flow and use of area for community gatherings.
- Replace flooring.
- Update bathrooms.
- Remove wallpaper in Gathering Area and paint.

Rejuvenating our kitchen:

Estimated Cost \$78,000

Reasons to update

- The kitchen is worn out and has outlived its usefulness as it is now configured.
- The kitchen is more challenging to use since it has not been updated. Many are not comfortable using the facility.
- People struggle to cook and set up.
- Cleaning is extremely difficult.

- The air conditioning does not work effectively since there are limited vents in the kitchen and is extremely hot when the temperature rises.
- The wiring is a safety issue as it is not up to code today.
- With use, we have seen the need to reconfigure the layout so that it is more efficient.

Plan of Action

- New gas cooktop/hot plate that is easier to use.
- New electric convection ovens in a double stack arrangement.
- New cabinetry for efficient storage.
- Reconfigure prep area for ease of use.

Reviving our worship space:

Estimated Cost \$20,000

Reasons to update

- Stewardship of what God has given our community by taking care of our worship space to the glory of God.
- Carpet is over 50 years old and needs replacing.
- Walls have cracks and repainting is needed.

Plan of Action

- Replace carpeting in the sanctuary.
- Repair cracks in the walls and repaint the sanctuary.

Renewing our Parking lot:

Estimated Cost \$110,000

Reasons to update

- Safety issue since the present surface from the 1970's has uneven surfaces and potholes which makes it difficult for many people to walk across it.
- The area is not very welcoming, and some areas are not efficiently marked.
- Drainage is a problem with heavy rains.
- Large tree at entrance to circular drive is cracking the asphalt and curbing.

Plan of Action

- Repave the parking lot.
- Solve the drainage issue and save tree.
- Fewer holes, less water, more welcoming.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

St. Andrew's Lutheran Church

Pastor Trump shared pictures of the recent meal the congregation served for the homeless at Christ Mission. More than 40 children and adults volunteered. It was a wonderful outreach opportunity, and we had a great response from our congregation.

Deacon Holland asked to add new members as a new business item. Anna Berger added Deacon Holland's item and the following additional items as new business: the Church Mutual payment for damaged carpet, new fund for capital campaign, and the name of the Youth Activity Fund.

Capital Campaign Update: Anna Berger passed out pledge forms for the capital campaign and asked members to turn them in to her or Ron Walrath by Oct. 1, 2022. She stated that Ron Walrath would speak before both services on Oct. 8 and would share how much the church has committed. She stated we needed to have 100% of council members pledge as church leaders and that all amounts of pledges would be needed to be successful. She also stated we had approximately \$141,000 in the bank for the campaign with an additional \$85,000 pledged, resulting in being near the half-way mark of the campaign's \$500,000 goal.

Ms. Berger stated luncheon celebration would be held on Oct. 30 and council members would be asked to help serve the meal or assist with the program. Ms. Berger indicated Hudson's BBQ was secured as the caterer and the cost would be approximately \$2,300. She indicated we had a \$1,000 contribution for the meal and asked where we should pay for the remainder. John Trump made a motion for the expense to be paid from the Stewardship line item. Robbie Derrick seconded the motion, and the motion passed. Robbie Derrick asked when the construction for the campaign projects would begin. Council discussed the cash flow options for the campaign and decided to table the discussion until the October or November council meetings when more pledge information would be available.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS CONTINUED

President's Report: Anna Berger submitted a written report prior to the meeting. She stated the following four council members had terms that would expire at the end of the year and were eligible for a second term: John Bass, Robbie Derrick, Mary Lynn Fulmer, and Beth Hutchison. Ms. Berger stated Mr. Derrick and Ms. Fulmer would not seek a second term and Mr. Bass and Ms. Hutchison had not indicated if they would serve another term as of the council meeting. She indicated Georgia Godfrey's second term on council would expire this year and she would not be eligible to serve another immediate term. With the vacancy of one seat earlier in the year, four to six council seats would need to be filled. Ms. Berger made a motion for Georgia Godfrey, Pastor Trump, Deacon Holland, Ruth Lackstrom, and herself to serve on the Nominating Committee. Darrick Williams seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Trump submitted a written report prior to the meeting. There were no questions or discussion.

Deacon's Report: Deacon Holland submitted a written report prior to the meeting. She stated she was working with Paige Gibbons on the Saint A's Play Day that would begin this month. Deacon Holland also shared information on the women's retreat at Lutheridge and book club.

Children's Ministry: Ingrid Driggers submitted a written report prior to the meeting. There were no questions or discussion.

Finance report: Mr. Teusink led a discussion of the draft 2023 Ministry Plan. Pastor Trump and Deacon Holland were not present during the discussion of staff expenses and salaries. Members discussed the church had an excellent history of giving to the SC Synod and organizations in the community. Council reviewed and discussed each of the sections in the ministry plan and offered suggestions. These suggestions will be incorporated into the draft Ministry Plan and further considered when the council reviews and approves the 2023 Ministry Plan at the October council meeting.

Property: Robbie Derrick submitted a written report prior to the meeting. He stated several members and staff had asked about adding security cameras to the outside of the church. Fire suppression and evacuation plans for the church were also discussed. Tom Henry offered to help with the evacuation plans. Mr. Derrick will contact the security alarm company to discuss options and bring back to council. He will also ask Mr. Henry to work on the evacuation plans.

Social Ministry: Ingrid Driggers submitted a written report prior to the meeting. Deacon Holland provided an update on the backpack program. She stated that Harvest Hope would provide prepackaged food packs and would deliver them to E.E. Taylor Elementary School on our church's behalf.

Youth: Georgia Godfrey submitted a written report prior to the meeting. There were no questions or discussion. Deacon Holland shared the children and youth roster.

New Business:

Deacon Holland shared that we had two new families—the Cannon family and the Buckles family—that would like to join the church. Anna Berger made a motion to approve the Cannon and Buckles family as new members. Darrick Williams seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Prayer Concerns:

Pastor Trump asked for prayer concerns and led the council in prayer.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
